Magna Carta turns 801



The American Bar Association (ABA) Magna Carta Memorial; Runnymede.

The 15th June 2016 marked the 801st anniversary of Magna Carta. Sealed at Runnymede by Bad King John ("Lackland"), the Charter of the Barons is the foundation of many of the liberties enjoyed by nearly two billion people in more than 100 countries in the 21st Century. Principally, it established that no man is above the Rule of Law.

There were many events in the anniversary week which commemorated the Charter's legacy, a year later following the issue of the Charter of the Forest described as the "Great Charter", Magna Carta. Lectures, books released, open days at universities and museums, and many posts on social media – some featured on page 3.

Prior to the 801st, both the Magna Carta Trust and the American Bar Association shared a video of William Hubbard speaking on BBC News on 15th June 2015 about the significance of the Great Charter. Mr Hubbard, President of the ABA in 2015, and spoke on the day alongside The Princess Royal, US Attorney General Loretta Lynch, and UK Foreign


Ongoing developments at Runnymede will ensure it will continue to be visited as a site of international importance. The erection of a commemorative statue of HM Queen Elizabeth II, alongside a garden which commemorates the history of hard – won human rights, are near the site of the ABA Memorial.













Patron's Lunch, Sunday 12th June 2016, The Mall





It wasn't a very pleasant day for the Queen's 90th birthday picnic on the Mall. It began at around 11 and rained for several hours. But it was a happy one. The day itself worked like clockwork.

The **6pm 12th June BBC special** began with a rapid timing video of the night before. It was astonishing how many vehicles and people were on the Mall throughout the night turning the avenue of the parade into a picnic in the park. Streets and park were clean, stewards and security in their places. Rain poured down on us in our plastic ponchos (see photo).

Those representing the Magna Carta Trust included the President of the Royal Commonwealth Society Lord Howell and Lady Howell; Former Minister of Justice Lord and Lady McNally; Chairman of the Pilgrims Society Mr Ron Freeman; representing the Chairman of Magna Carta Trust Lord (John) Dyson was Mr Peter Farr; Mr Tony Halmos, City of London Corporation; Chancellor Lewis Neilson (National Society Magna Charta Dames and Barons), our publishing stars, Christopher Lloyd (The Magna Carta Chronicle) and Kourtney Harper (History Rocks, Magna Carta) and Lady Worcester and myself.

The Royals worked the crowd in the way only the Royals can do. With military precision, each took their place with a 1,000 or so people to glad-hand. The Princess Royal worked the crowd opposite to us on the Mall, moving along speaking to people perhaps every 20 yards until she and her husband, Admiral Sir Timothy Laurence, crossed to our side, perhaps 200 yards away. The Queen and Prince Philip were due to leave the Palace at 3pm. At c. 2.55pm the Princess Royal was 20 yards away from where we were standing. She turned and looked over and headed our way. Her welcome to us, representing Magna Carta Trust, made our day.


In Pictures - Magna Carta honoured on Social Media:










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Magna Carta Events: 2016

Commemorate Magna Carta's 800th Anniversary with a trip through the historical sites which played major roles in the birth of the Great Charter.





First Fairhaven Lecture at Royal Holloway, University of London:

Royal Holloway, University of London, hosted the first lecture in the Fairhaven Lecture Series on Monday 13th June. Funded by the Magna Carta Trust, the lecture series uses the anniversary week of the Great Charter to highlight contemporary issues facing our modern rights around the globe related to the role of Magna Carta in the 21st Century. Nine more lectures will be delivered across the next nine years.

Mr David Anderson QC is the Independent Reviewer of Terrorism Legislation and delivered a lecture entitled 'Terrorism and Tolerance' at RHUL's Windsor Auditorium. He discussed the extent to which international law can help to reconcile free society with the prevention of extremism, and the part tolerance has to play in the process. In 2011, David Anderson was appointed by the Home Secretary to be the Independent Reviewer of Terrorism Legislation; in 2015 he was chosen as 'Legal Personality of the Year' by a panel of judges.

Magna Carta Lecture at Lincoln Cathedral available online:

On Wednesday 1st June, HE Alexander Downer, Australian High Commissioner to the United Kingdom, delivered a lecture at Lincoln Cathedral on the relationship between the Great Charter and Australia. **This can be read online here.** Lincoln Cathedral hosts a Magna Carta Lecture each year. A 1215 copy of the Great Charter is housed in a bespoke award - winning vault in Lincoln Castle.


To celebrate the only living connection with Magna Carta and 800 years since 1215, seedlings from the ancient 'Parliament Oak' have been grown by experts at the Woodland Trust for planting at some of the Magna Carta Barons villages and towns.

Attempts were made to grow seedlings from another 'King John Oak' in a private deer park in Devon last year, but the tree is in such poor health they all failed.

The namesake of the 'Parliament Oak' originates from Clipstone Park in Nottinghamshire, near King John's Palace. It is believed that John and seven other kings held 'parleys' under it, hence its name and how we get the term 'Parliament'.

Each village and town will be ceremoniously planting its oak seedling in the autumn and will be taking responsibility for its care during its early years. One seedling will be planted in Lanvallay, Brittany, the ancestral home of the Magna Carta Baron, William de Lanvalei, and now Walkern's twin town.

These oak trees will provide a unique and living connection with one of the most significant events of our democratic past.





Magna Carta Trust funding restores Beaney Baron:




The Beaney Museum, Canterbury, has restored a Magna Carta Baron statue, which depicts Saher de Quincy, Earl of Winchester. This project has been financially supported by the Magna Carta Trust's 800th Anniversary Commemoration Committee.

De Quincey was one of the twenty-five Barons appointed to enforce the Charter's terms upon King John. The Canterbury Museums and Galleries collection includes a set of 15 statues depicting the Magna Carta Barons.

The project achieved the following objectives:

- The conservation of the Earl of Winchester statue.
- A new permanent display of recently conserved Robert de Fitzwalter, Stephen Langton and Earl of Winchester statues in the *People and Places Gallery* – one of The Beaney's permanent galleries. (Pictured above)
- Engaging and accessible learning activities located within the gallery to accompany the new display.



The Beaney's *People and Places Gallery* displays and interprets the stories of the people and places of East Kent. Also situated in the gallery is one of the Explorer Points (pictured above) which provide an opportunity for younger children and families to further explore the collections on display through informal learning, and now includes new activities that relate to the statues and Magna Carta.

These include a Children's Magna Carta, fun Medieval Games, such as Hazard and Five Men's Morris, Medieval characters to colour in, and an activity to design a Heraldic crest.

Magna Carta Barons publish new book



The Magna Carta Barons- ed. by Peter Sinclair

This is the first book to tell the story of the 25 Magna Carta Barons: who they were; what they did; and what happened to them after Magna Carta was sealed 800 years ago.

The book is an A4 sewn paperback, of 68 pages.

Chosen by the rebel army at Runnymede in June 1215 to guarantee King John's compliance with the terms of the Charter, these were men whose family ties and sense of entitlement made them a powerful opposition to the King. Most held extensive lands in the North and East of England and many were descendants of the Normans who had accompanied William the Conqueror in 1066 generations before.

It was their fight for the fundamental principle that everyone is subject to the Rule of Law that laid the basis for democracies we enjoy today across the world — while the struggle against tyranny and arbitrary rule continues in many less fortunate nations.

The biographies of the Barons were written by **Professor Nigel Saul of Royal Holloway, University of London**, and the photographs were chosen by the villages and towns where the Barons had their chief manors in 1215 as part of the celebrations to mark the 800th anniversary in 2015. The book also includes sketches and architectural drawings of what key locations would have looked like in the 13th Century (such as Pleshey, below).

Magna Carta: The Foundation of Freedom 1215-2015

Nicholas Vincent, Editor and Contributor, Third Millennium Publishing, (2015) £29.50 hb, £24.50 pb.

With Nicholas Vincent leading off with the law before Magna Carta, Plantagenet tyranny, King John, etc., joined with other leading Magna Carta scholars including David Carpenter, Anthony Musson, Justin Champion, Joyce Lee Malcolm (on America's entrenchment) and others, plus outstanding illustrations, this book is the gold standard of the breadth and depth of both a fabulous 'coffee table' book and serious scholarship.

Outstandingly written and illustrated. Makes a splendid gift.



Magna Carta

David Carpenter, Penguin Classics (2015) £7.69 pb

Professor Carpenter's peers describe him as 'the real deal', who together with Vincent are the top rank of today's Magna Carta

scholars. This 2^{nd} edition of this Penguin Classic breaks new ground.

A definitive work, comprehensive, and is brilliantly structured.



Magna Carta: A Very Short Introduction Nicholas Vincent, Oxford University Press (2012) £5.99

Packed with facts, understanding and intricacies of the XIII Century, plus before and after, focussing on Magna Carta, this 110 page paperback fits neatly into pocket

and purse, and is ideal for an overall sweep of what was going on, where, by who, and when of the start of what we now know as Magna Carta's victories on the battlefields of the barons' wars, the negotiations with Bad King John, its failure as a peace treaty and eventual success as 'the greatest constitutional document of all time'.

Best read for a broad look at the Great Charter.



Magna Carta Uncovered

From the pens of two senior QCs who have for many years had a serious interest in Magna Carta. Nicely structured with a most useful timeline, laying out compact

descriptions of the principal players, King John, William Marshal, Stephen Langton, and the Rebel Barons, an excellent chapter on London, and succeeding chapters following The Great Charter's passage through the centuries. *Excellent, forensic, and entertaining.*



Magna Carta: Muse & Mentor

Randy Holland, Ed., Library of Congress (2014) £50/\$55.20 hb

Excellent contributions including Igor Judge on William Marshal, one of the most important forgotten men of history. On his death in 1219 in his funeral oration the Archbishop of Canterbury described Marshal as "the

greatest knight that ever lived". Others included Dick Howard's Magna Carta American Journey, Lady Justice Arden's Magna Carta and the Judges, Caroline Harris' King John and Magna Carta in Popular Culture.

Claire Breay and Julian Harrison The British library Publishing Divisions, 2nd Edition (2011) £19.99 pb


Contributions from Nicholas Vincent, David Carpenter, Justin Champion, Alexander Lock

As written as sympathetic a book about King John as one could muster. King John was successful at fundraising,

but failed as a father, brother, son, in battle, in justice, in management above all. He alienated his family, his followers, the common people and all the media that existed at that time. Well documented.

King John: England, Magna Carta, and the Making of a Tyrant

Stephen Church, Macmillan (2015)

'King John he was a bad man...' pretty well from start to finish. It's hard to find a good thing to say for him, but Stephen tries.

Called 'Lackland' and 'Softsword', he was his father's favourite, and he let him down at every turn. Failing to win back Normandy at the battle of Bouvines in 1214 was the last straw for the Barons and led to Runnymede. His death in 1216 led to his successor's reissue of Magna Carta.

The Greatest Knight: The Remarkable Life of William Marshal, the Power Behind Five English Thrones

Thomas Ashbridge, Simon and Schuster UK (2015) hb

William Marshal was one of the two

defining characters in the middle of the action over many years, King John's loyal retainer near his end, but originally was a trusted member of John's mother, Eleanor, who'd saved his life early on. Late in life when John died, William became guardian to his nine year old son and overcoming the boy's opposition, reissued the Charter, after its being declared null by Pope Innocent III.

Deserves the title: The Greatest Knight who ever lived.



Beyond Magna Carta



Not just another Magna Carta book, but added value.




